What will you learn about in SOCIAL STUDIES?

Physical Geography and Social Studies Skills: Focus on North America landforms, natural resources, natural disasters, climate and vegetation, maps, charts, graph skills, Five Themes of Geography, research, primary and secondary sources, and citations

Government: Limited and unlimited forms, processes, and citizenship

Economics: Factors of production, foreign policies, developed vs. developing, entrepreneurship, and globalization

Human Geography: characteristics of culture, human environment interaction, migration, emigration/immigration, adapt and modify, and globalization

Current Events are integrated in to all units of study. CNN Student News is utilized on an almost daily basis. This reinforces learning and provides real world connections.

The study of the continents, oceans, and countries are learned about during the second semester through the spiraling of concepts above.

TEXTBOOKS - Textbooks will be used throughout the school year in class. If you would like to keep one at home, I can check I one out to you. We will not issue books to students.

LUNCH BUNCH - Bunch is the first 20 minutes of lunch when students that require assistance can work with me on assignments, can complete work that has already been assigned, or read. Most all teachers have this once or more each week, so students can take advantage of the opportunity every day if they wish. (Due to my class schedule this year, students will report to Mrs. Sadosky in Room 404 for Lunch Bunch unless directed otherwise.)
